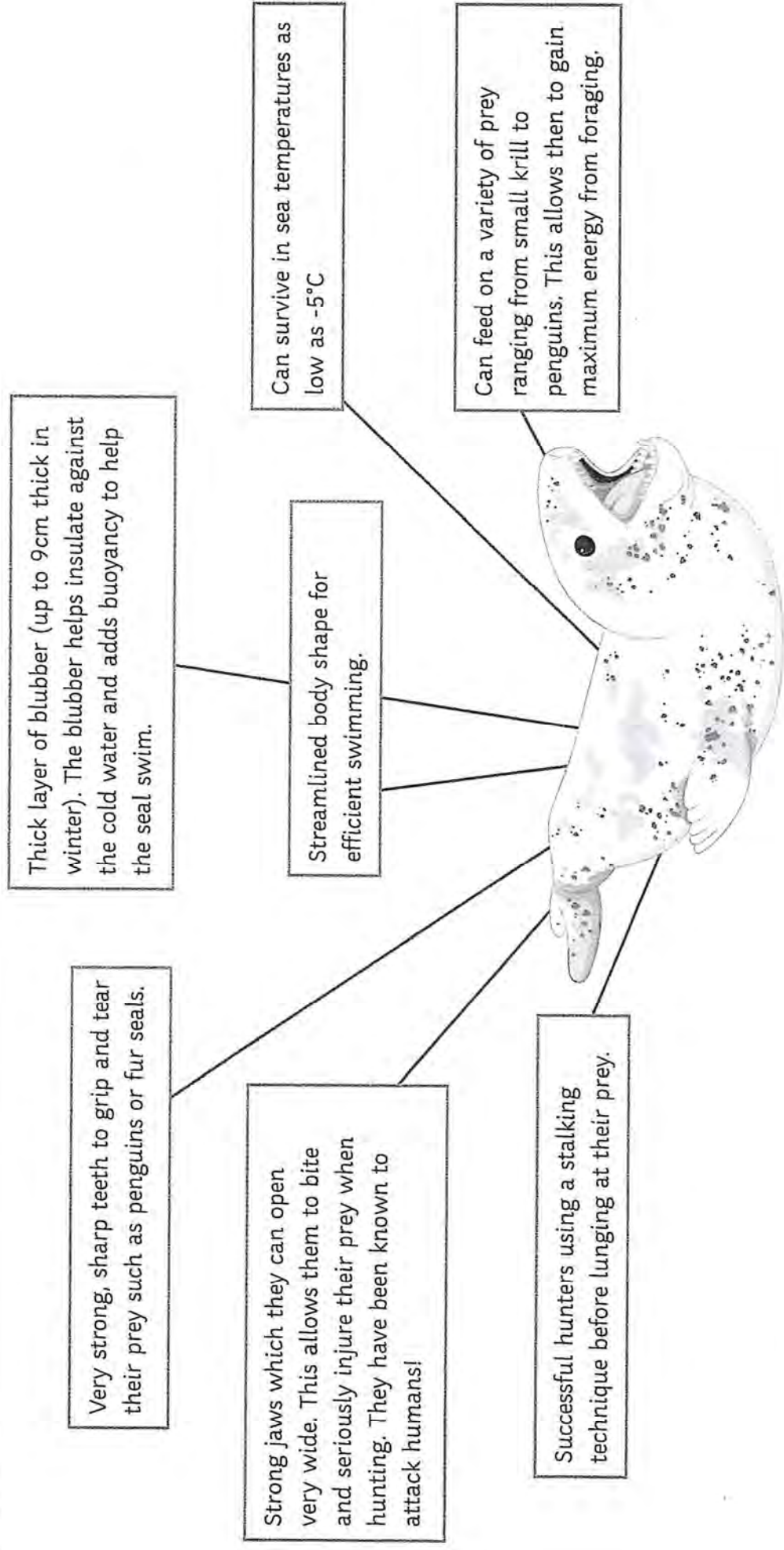


Something Extra?
